  - (b) Critically comment on the portrayal of Time as a destructive force in Shakespeare's sonnet 65.
  - (c) Attempt a critical appreciation of John Donne's 'The Flea'.
2. Answer any *two* of the following questions within 125 words each :  $4 \times 2 = 8$ 
  - (a) Comment on the concluding couplet of Shakespeare's Sonnet No. 64.
  - (b) "And thus I say to little English boy"- What does the speaker of this line say to "little English boy" and why?
  - (c) Briefly discuss the significance of Donne's use of the Compass-image in 'A Valediction Forbidding Mourning'.
  - (d) What is 'true beauty' according to Sonnet 79 from Edmund Spenser's *Amoretti* ? Explain briefly.
