# Annexure: II FEEDBACK REPORT-2018

Students' feedback for 2018 was collected manually. Feedback from the honours students was collected. 15% or 15 students from each class, whichever was less, was taken into the sample. For a biased less data collection a teacher, who was not associated with the subject, was entrusted to collect the feedback. Date was collected for 14 full time teachers and 10 Govt. Approved Part Time teachers. After statistical analysis using Excel programme following results were found.

Before handing over the schedule for collecting feedback the concerned teacher described the purpose and importance of the feedback to the students. He also explained the meaning of each of the entry on the schedule and assured them that there was no fear of being targeted by the particular teacher for whom any adverse feedback was given.

Feedback was collected on 10 point scale as suggested by NAAC. The obtained score was converted into percentage and the percentage and on basis of the percentage score the indicator specific Bar diagram for each individual faculty was drawn. It is to be noted that the data for full time and part time faculties were processed separately. The Blue Graph are for the full time and the red was for part time faculty. At last the percentage score was clubbed into five categories as follows:



## 2. Skill Development Cell

Goal	To familiar the students to communication skill and soft skill	
	To enhance employability of the passed out students	
Context	In the existing higher education system an ordinary graduate can acquire very little job skill during his academic courses. Thus s/he requires acquiring extra skill to compete in the job market. Once our Principal visited his friends' house in Kerala where he found all the families in the locality were well off in respect to their financial status/living status. Out of his curiosity he came to know that at least one of the members from each of the family was working in middle-east. Their earnings were translated into the well-off financial status of those families. Thus it was determined by the principal that he would make arrangement for learning Arabic and English for his students so that they can enhance their skill for employment in the nation, middle-east or other countries.	
Practices	College established a fully modern technology equipped language laboratory with forty seating capacity. It was running from 2016-17 academic session with the Diploma course (One year duration) in both the subjects. The lab is equipped with a computer along with a large TV screen. Each seat has a head phone directly connected with the computer. The computer is loaded with the course materials in audio-video files of conversation of a particular language and arranged according to its level of difficulties. The students are given chance to listen the conversation and then follow the style among their peer group. Each language has three week days to practice the conversation. There is a facilitator in the lab, who helps the learners in required steps. The college also established a computer lab with nine PCs. The rural students have very little access to computer technology. Rarely any student belongs to a personal computer at their home owing to their poverty. Under these circumstances the college in collaboration with the Jawaharlal Nehru National Youth Computer Centre (JNNYCC)started an one year diploma programme in Computer Application for the students with a nominal fees (Rs.50/- per month). Students are taught the basic applications like Paints, MS word, Excel, Power Point, internet surfing, HTML, C-Language, Visual Basic etc. through this programme. The lab was developed by college; but the instructor/faculty is provided by JNNYCC.	

	Weekly two days they get classes one in theory and one in practical of one hour duration each.
Evidence of Success	Last year total 71 students were enrolled in the courses of the two languages out of which 40 were passed out. During the current academic session 52 students were enrolled. In the computer application, this year 134 students will appear in the ensuing examination and 185 are new enrolled in the programme. A number of passed out students could manage job in different sector including bank using the soft skill developed in through the programme.



## Workshop on the ICT based Quality Improvement in Teaching-Learning

IQAC of Kaliachak College organized the workshop for the Teaching community for their quality improvement in connection to use the latest technology in the class-room. In a class room when a teacher uses black board he/she has to keep the entire class behind his back. He cannot observe the students activities during his board work. In order to avoid this problem we arranged WACOM, an interactive digital board which when connected to an OHP via a laptop can transmit the board work on the screen immediately. This board work can be saved as pdf format for future use as well as communication among the students. Therefore, it was necessary to make the teachers acquainted with the new technology. We invited a technician from the product supplying agency to disseminate the elementary knowledge about the instrument and the techniques of operation among the teachers. With this objective the workshop was conducted by the IQAC.

All the teachers are informed duly to attend the workshop and their attendance (28) makes the programme successful. Dr. Nazibar Rahaman, Principal inaugurated the workshop and discuss the objectives of the programme. He urged the teaching community to acquire expertise on the use of the teaching aids. He was also present in the workshop for quite some time and enjoyed the uniqueness of the new device. Mr. Tapan Das, from Tihots, the product supplying agency, introduced the device and its different parts to the present teachers. He then showed the connectivity of the device in practical with the OHP and Laptop with necessary cables. He also invited the interested teachers to do the same in his presence. After establishing the necessary connectivity Mr. Das discussed the use of the WACOM, the interactive board and the digital pen to write on the board. He showed how to use the digital board, how to calibrate the digital pen, how to create new file, save in pdf format and share it.

After a theoretical discussion the teacher participants were asked to operate the device individually in the classroom under the supervision of the technologically advanced participants namely Jiaul Hoque, Sayeem Ahmed, Pulak Saha and Tapan Das himself.

#### **GREEN AUDIT REPORT**

Educational Institutions are supposed to be the miniature form of the society. That is why implementation of a benevolent activity plays an efficacious role there as it teaches the future generation more effectively which directly or indirectly influences our society. So our Kaliachak College as an educational institution conducted a first stage environmental audit by organising an audit team from the faculty of this college pursuing for a substantial improvement of environment. It has taken a number of positive steps to reduce its adverse environmental impact. The college conducts the internal Green Audit in academic year 2017-2018 and is keen to induce ecofriendly atmosphere in the campus and spread the awareness for the necessity of green environment to the community through the students, the backbone of our country. It tries to create an awareness on the use of natural resources in the home, college, local community and beyond.



## TARGET AREAS OF GREEN AUDIT:

Green Audit forms part of a resource management process which includes water, energy and waste etc and helps us to be economic in using this precious resources. It also focuses on the issue of minimum wastage and less pollution. All these indicators are assessed in the process of Green Auditing. In this report four areas are targeted which are:

- 1. Water management
- 2. Energy management

- 3. Green campus management
- 4. Carbon Management and
- 5. Waste Management

#### METHODOLOGY OF AUDITING:

The methodology includes preparation and filling up questionnaire, site inspection, interview and discussion, observation and reviews of the documents.

#### **KEY FINDINGS:**

#### WATER MANAGEMENT:

Kaliachak College is very much economic in water consumption. Water is used for the purpose of drinking, washing, cleaning, watering and in laboratory etc. There is a pond to harvest the rain water from the adjacent low land. This water is used for irrigation of the litchi orchard during the dry season. For drinking purpose, the PHE supplied arsenic free water is the prime source. This water is also lifted from the great Ganga. On an average daily consumption of drinking water in a college of six thousand students is 1000 litres (approx), whereas for the five laboratories and the lavatory 2000 litres of ground water is used.

#### **ENERGY MANAGEMENT:**

There is on an average 1600 units electric energy consumption per month in this college for the purpose of using computer, copier, tube lights, CFL Bulbs, and in various laboratories. There are air condition machines but these electronic appliances are used occasionally. Gas cylinders are used for cooking in canteen and laboratory. The college has a hydro-carbon based digi-set as an emergency source of power. Its annual fuel consumption is .... litres. It is found during the on site visit that the college is using the energy efficient electrical appliances like CFL bulbs, 7-star refrigerator, AC etc. The note worthy point is that the staff are very much careful about the economic use of energy. They switch-off the appliances when they are not in use. The class rooms are based on natural lighting and ventilation to save the power.

#### **GREEN CAMPUS MANGEMENT:**

College campus is clean and green. Most of the open area is covered with trees of various specis and that is why birds, insects and reptiles are found here which creates a balanced ecological atmosphere. To maintain eco-friendly ambience certain initiatives have been taken.

- 1. Green building with canopy of trees for quality living is maintained.
- 2. "Know green and think green"-theme is promoted on the campus
- 3. Awareness on "Say no to plastic" is organized in the campus
- 4. Plantation is a compulsory annual activity of the college
- 5. Environmental Studies are made compulsory for the students to increase awareness on global warming, bio-diversity and pollution.

## **CARBON EMMISSION:**

Though there is no such system developed for carbon accounting, the authority is conscious for its negative impact on environment. So, certain good practices are found among different stake holders of the college.

- 1. The students are found to use bye-cycles to reduce the consumption of fossil fuel.
- 2. The faculty, students and other stake-holders of the college use the public common transportation.
- 3. Our Principal and Professors share their car with other staff to economise the fuel consumption;
- 4. In the canteen LPG oven is used instead of kerosene stove to minimize the carbon emission

#### **WASTE MANAGEMENT:**

The disposal system for degradable and non-degradable waste is also well and good.

- 1. "Reduce-Reuse-Recycle" methods are followed
- 2. The broken glass apparatus are sold for recycling
- 3. Old paper is sold for reuse
- 4. Chemical waste from the labs are disposed off in the soak pit
- 5. Canteen garbage are bio-degradable in nature and put in a pit for composting to use in the garden

#### **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

The college has successfully developed the sustainable green environment in the college campus. The initiatives are praiseworthy. Some are notable for instance. Such as:

- 1. The garden inside the college campus is found well-maintained.
- 2. Notice boards and signs in the campus are in satisfactory level to decrease the use of natural resources.
- 3. College ensures minimum use of ground water;
- 4. Economic use of energy is another good habit that the institute has developed
- 5. Use of hydro-carbon fuel for personal as well as for the institutional purposes is minimum

However, there are some shortcomings found to be addressed on behalf of the college. So to enhance the endeavour the auditing team recommended some measures:

- 1. To generate awareness of the students regarding energy conservation, there should be placards on economic use of energy in the campus;
- 2. College has enough scope to generate solar energy for its own consumption;
- 3. There must be a space for using water of the adjacent river to drop down the ground water consumption;
- 4. The conducting of seminars and group discussions, poster competition and quiz contest on environmental education should be encouraged.
- 5. The college should think to develop a composting plant for the waste management.
- 6. While developing class room or office, care should be taken to ensure enough day light and air within;

## **CONCLUSION:**

The environmental awareness initiatives are substantial. This may lead to the prosperous future and thus a sustainable development. The college created a green campus with collective effort of Faculties, students, N.C.C and N.S.S. volunteers, parents and all other stake-holders. The sustainability of this effort will boost up the new generation to take care of the environment of the campus in particular and that of the earth in general.
